Welcome to the second public report about how cricket is setting out to be more inclusive in Wales. This shows how BOTH Glamorgan Cricket and Cricket Wales are changing cricket in Wales into a place where everyone feels they are respected, belong and are treated fairly. This is a joint report across the recreational and professional game.

WHAT WE ARE STRIVING TO ACHIEVE?

Cricket Wales & Glamorgan Cricket have set out to be the most inclusive team sport in Wales. As a reminder our goals about making cricket inclusive are to:

- 1 Train our staff so they are well equipped to give people with a great experience in cricket and be culturally competent to tackle discrimination.
- 2 Ensure that the talent pathway is transparent, so everyone is confident that there are no unfair barriers or prejudice in its operation.
- 3 Ensure there is a warm welcome for everyone to play cricket so that places where we play cricket are fully equipped, in terms of infrastructure, playing and practice facilities, so that everyone feels 'at home'.

This report shows how, all in aspects of cricket, we are making this a growing reality. We haven't sorted it completely but are progressing. We know that cricket in Wales is now reaching to new groups and communities, so we have collected some examples across themes to share these stories.

This report is structured around three main objectives (PTO) which have been carefully aligned with England and Wales Cricket Board's own EDI plan.

We have grown our inclusion agenda via the retelling of the impact on clubs by volunteers. The effort and ongoing commitment in our communications and telling multiple stories is paying off.

The scale of our non-mainstream i.e. non cricket club, outreach is currently:

- 14 street hubs
- 5 Wicketz hubs
- 3 disability hubs

We have also been actively engaging young people from nonmainstream settings into the performance pathway via a changed nomination process- opening this up to any child who can now self-nominate via video and proactive seeking of non-mainstream scouting opportunities.

Glamorgan's cricket commitment and bid to become one of the teams in the new professional structure demonstrates this absolute desire. This has been widely shared, and the club is proud of this big step forward. This headline has enabled a widespread understanding of the games' desire to be one club (Glamorgan (two teams).

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Offering adapted forms of the game and times to play is key during Ramadan. At the National Cricket Centre we have regularly run midnight 'tapeball' cricket to accommodate the needs of Ramadan and give an option for cricketers to still train where Ramadan practices make conventional training a difficult exercise.

2024 EID celebrations offered an opportunity to engage further with the Muslim community. An original plan to host a prayer event in the national cricket centre and provide cricket / social activities was initially thwarted by a major facility crisis within Sophia Gardens.

The growth of the recreational game has outpaced its fabric, so we have made many efforts to support clubs via targeted funding schemes and promoting clubs that are modelling this especially regarding the provision of fit for purpose female toilets, period products and better and welcoming club houses.

Opening up the imagery of the Glamorgan Museum and extending this across to the wider stadium in terms of 'if I see it, I can believe it' with its strong themes of inclusion + Welsh identity + girls' & women's cricket are and will be strongly demonstrated in both conventional and innovative public imagery throughout the Sophia Gardens Stadium.



WHAT SETS THIS APART?

The imagery project is unique to the stadium using a revamped museum & heritage gallery, the stadium will feature several large-scale public mural / banner pieces of artwork to emphasise the commitment to Inclusion/female game/Welsh identity. MAKING CRICKET FACILITIES FIT FOR INCLUSION



WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Sophia Gardens Cardiff provides a venue which caters for all of our visitors' needs. It is our intent to provide information about the accessibility of facilities we have in place. Glamorgan Cricket is a proud member of the Level Playing Field organisation.

WHAT SETS THIS APART?

A wide range of facilities have been created at Sophia gardens so that people with faith needs, ambulatory needs or neuro-diverse needs can all feel at home.



WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Via the network of Swansea mosques, a cricket development opportunity arose to connect them with a local league and nets facility. We also identified members of the local community who have both gone through the ECB coach education programme and now they deliver these sessions and are on our payroll as casual coaches.



WHAT SETS THIS APART?

This has been a huge success, and one coach Amman recently won our Cricket Wales Junior Coach of the year in the national volunteer awards. Swansea Mosque has received £70K investment via Sport Wales into the hall facility we bid for and managed as part of a Capital Grant. We are maximizing this investment with this inter mosque programme.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Street Cricket and Wicketz projects have created weekly cricket sessions all year round in communities where there is no club or cricket facility.

Street centres often host Pop-Up Cricket sessions, Activator Training for community members, and School Holiday Programmes to engage young people during breaks. Faith-friendly sessions ensure they do not clash with faith-based clubs and classes. Participation in Summer Festivals, attendance / presence at the local carnivals.

WHAT SETS THIS APART?

We have connected with many areas of multiple deprivation / free school meals indices using outreach projects and curriculum teaching. We have an active programme with 150 schools in the highest Welsh Government category of social deprivations (FSM) which equates to a reach of 15,000 children.

Using powerful & emotive videography to show the unique ability of cricket to reach and connect especially across multiple ethnicities and to show the impact of the game on changed lives See this film about a project in Ely Cardiff shortly after some local riots.

Often centres will, where possible, offer activities for refugee communities, along with Pop-Up Cricket to introduce the game in an informal and welcoming environment.

WHAT SETS THIS APART?

This video showcases the transformative power of cricket in Maesyrhandir Primary School, Newtown, where Chance to Shine has been delivering cricket sessions to young people. In an area facing economic challenges, with over 40% of students on free school meals and limited youth facilities, the cricket sessions have given children a new passion and energy. Teachers praise the inclusive nature of the programme, ensuring every student, regardless of ability, is engaged and thriving. Hear from the coaches, teachers, and pupils as they share their experiences, and the positive impact cricket is making in their school and community.

St Christopher's is an Integrated Special School in Wrexham. After running sessions in the school, Chance to Shine and Cricket Wales Coach Jamie Griffiths saw there was a demand for cricket outside of school as well. To meet the demand, they set up Gwersyllt Disability Cricket Club which provides opportunities those with disabilities to develop their fitness, social and interpersonal skills. It's making a huge daily difference, and they learn how to share, to work as a team and build friendships.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Glamorgan's school outreach programme across 90% of Cardiff primary schools and within this at least 50% are ethnically diverse. In some schools the Free School Meal (FSM) and ethnically diverse figures are 90%.



WHAT SETS THIS APART?

Cricket Wales' annual audit for affiliated club members show that ethnically diverse membership has increased from 6 & 7 % (junior/senior) in 2013 to 11% juniors & 16% seniors in 2024.

ENGAGED PARTNERS WITH A HEART FOR COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND SOCIAL IMPACT



WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Because of our commitment to making people 'feel at home' in cricket; Cricket Wales has received increased financial support from Chance to Shine, ECB, Lords Taverners. Glamorgan Cricket has received support from the Jo Cox Foundation and Welsh Government.



WHAT SETS THIS APART?

This demonstrates a unique approach to connect with a wide range of partners to show the power of cricket to support children and families in underserved communities.

The connection of Glamorgan Cricket with SPAR meant that a successful indoor Schools festival was enhanced with a food parcel for every child taking part.

A scheme with Save the Children helped needy families with presents.

South Wales Police Community Team carried out a Hate Crime campaign which developed some effective imagery with our school visits to Sophia Gardens.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Cricket Wales and Glamorgan have provided volunteering opportunities at major events, including One Day Internationals and The Hundred competition. Volunteers receive free kit, training, access to the games, and valuable experience to boost their CVs. There are also opportunities to apply for paid stewarding roles at Sophia Gardens each season, helping to address poverty and provide employment pathways for local community members.

The Riverside Challenge Festivals: with over 775 pupils from local wards which are some of the most deprived in Wales, took part in a series of festivals at Sophia Gardens.

Riverside is a ward in Cardiff and has one of the lowest wards of multiple deprivation in Wales. This shows a significant investment in reaching out to schools in underserved communities as part of the social impact work that Glamorgan Cricket offers.

In 2024 we partnered up with Walkers & Talkers to offer a monthly opportunity all year round for pole to reconnect, especially for older generation (retired) individuals to help retain connection and overcome potential loneliness via the Walkers & Talkers initiative. This currency reaches approx. 70 people on a monthly basis.

Very few sports have an offer of both playing the game, volunteering and engaging / reaching out to people of the retirement age band. This is entirely free.

The partnership with Save the Children and a local philanthropist has meant an innovative Christmas present scheme to connect with identified families who would defiantly go without in terms of Christmas presents.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE?

Both bodies have created a summary of the [strategy](#) and approach in video so that the commitment is clear.

As part of the Wales Week London, Cricket hosted an event at Lords Cricket Ground to hear from leading voices across Welsh sport, industry and cricket to showcase the powerful way that the game is driving and modelling inclusion. On #IWD2025 it was hugely impactful to share these reflections which both marked the huge progress achieved in the female game and more widely how the game has made people feel at home. Panellists with themselves significant media reach broadcast powerfully messages of support and praise for cricket's commitment and achievements.



WHAT SETS THIS APART?

Using respective media networks & local community networks that have been generated both organisations have made the creation of these reports front and centre of our media activity for a significant time period.

Here cricket in Wales has set out to both broadcast what it is doing to embed EDI but also to make itself accountable with one strategy, two EDI subcommittees, and embedded concepts in our new strategies for the game.

We have across both bodies endeavoured to make EDI BAU (business as Usual) by embedding into our new strategies as an underpinning foundation; building into work programmes; EDI sub committees; EDI strategy and separate action plans.

Using governance changes in affiliation to ensure that 100 % of all affiliated clubs (190) are signed up to & committed to the: Anti-discrimination Code; the best practice model disciplinary regulations and ongoing commitment to safeguarding in terms of policy and online compliance tool.

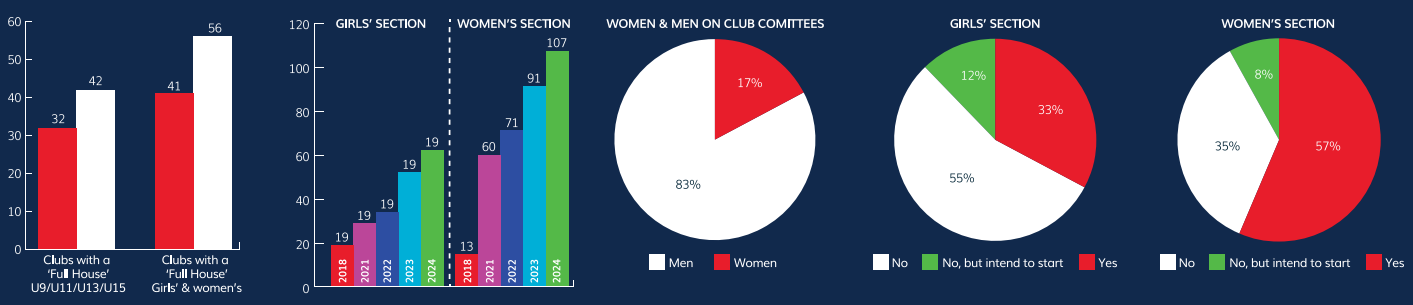
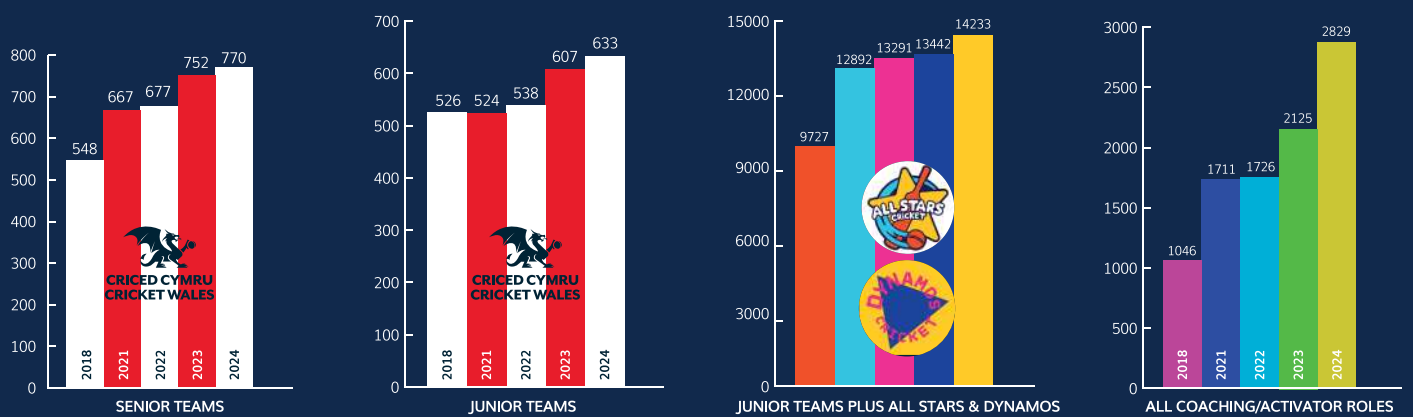
